Why are Moms Healthier in Australia? WHAMglobal Investigates

Over the years, the <u>Jewish Healthcare Foundation</u> (JHF) has traveled around the world to learn from the highest-performing healthcare systems and develop plans to improve care back in the states by adapting global best practices. Study tours to Israel, Korea, Japan, South Africa, and the U.K. have inspired JHF to launch demonstration projects that test new models of care, develop Champions programs that advance emerging workforce roles, and establish policy priorities that seek to demolish barriers to higher-quality, safer care.

JHF's newest supporting organization, the <u>Women's Health</u> <u>Activist Movement Global</u> (WHAMglobal), is committed to

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identifying the root causes of maternal mortality and supporting mothers and families through the entirety of their care. When it comes to improving maternal health outcomes, Australia provides ample inspiration.

Compared to women in the U.S., Australian women live longer, spend less on health care, and receive exemplary maternal health services and supports. Australia's high-quality maternal care system is a key reason why its maternal mortality rate (5.5 deaths per 100,000 women, according to 2015 study published in The Lancet) is nearly five times lower than the rate in the U.S. (26.4 deaths per 100,000 women).

To learn more, WHAMglobal recently organized a two-week Australian study tour to meet with women's health experts in the healthcare and university systems, conduct site visits, and participate in the International Women's Forum (IWF) Cornerstone Conference in Melbourne.

During meetings and site visits in New Castle, Melbourne, Sydney, and Tasmania, the WHAMglobal study group learned more about how Australia achieves better maternal health outcomes than the U.S. while delivering culturally-appropriate care. The WHAMglobal group visited leading providers, researchers, activists from maternal and child healthfocused organizations, including the Australian Commission on Safety and Quality, Australian Doula College, Healthy Mothers Healthy Families, MUM for MUM (a homebased maternity care program), New South Wales Agency for Clinical Innovation, New South Wales Ministry of Health, Royal Hospital for Women, Royal Women's Hospital, St. John of God Mother Baby Unit and Perinatal Mental Health Research Unit, and Women's Australian Atlas of Health Variation. The group also had

the pleasure of meeting with the Honorable Kate Warner AC, governor of Tasmania, and IWF cofounder Helen Rule.

The WHAMglobal group learned that midwives, doulas, and community health workers are vital components of Australia's maternal health system, and that Australia looks to proactively address potential problems. At multiple points during pregnancy, mothers receive a thorough assessment and are assigned a risk level that activates needed physical, mental, and social services. Post-pregnancy, mothers receive a new assessment and risk level to best support the family unit.

"Australia has an impressive, comprehensive view of pregnancy, protecting both mother and baby—before delivery, during delivery, and after delivery," Dr. Feinstein says. "When they find risk, they wrap services around the family unit. They also emphasize the importance of, and actively foster, the mother-baby relationship. This study tour will serve as a catalyst for WHAMglobal's mission to address our nation's maternal and infant mortality crisis and advance maternity care which achieves the outstanding outcomes of Australia."

25th Princeton Conference Shows How Employers are Getting Active, Demanding Healthcare Value

The Princeton Conference annually convenes leaders from academia, industry, and government to discuss and debate pressing healthcare issues during an invitation-only event. Through interactive panels and presentations, attendees talk economics and policy across disciplines and party lines. JHF is a long-time sponsor of the Princeton Conference, which is organized by a planning committee that includes Karen Feinstein.

The 2018 Princeton conference, which marked the 25th anniversary of the gathering, was held from May 22-24 at the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and Princeton University. More than 130 attendees took on topics that included activating employers to demand healthcare value, combating rising prescription drug costs, shaping the future of the healthcare workforce, making the business case for addressing the social determinants of health, and envisioning the future of Medicare and Medicaid.

Dr. Feinstein moderated a panel discussion that focused on ways that employers can lead the charge toward high-quality, value-based health care. The panelists included David A. Asch, MD, MBA, the John Morgan Professor and executive director of the Penn Medicine Center for Health Care Innovation at the University of Pennsylvania; Robert S. Kaplan, PhD,

senior fellow and Marvin Bower Professor of Leadership Development, Emeritus at the Harvard Business School; and Vivian S. Lee, MD, PhD, MBA, president of health platforms at Verily.

Dr. Asch focused on ways that health care could learn from other industries by adopting a philosophy of customer-focused design and rapid-cycle testing and implementation. He suggested that innovative employers that are getting into the health care space—including Amazon—could design health services and products for employees with a three-step validation process. That process centers on three key questions: does anyone want it, what will people do with it, and what are the outcomes of use.

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Dr. Kaplan shed light on employer opportunities to innovate in delivering health care to employees. He noted that large employers such as Boeing, GE, Lowe's, and Wal-Mart have created Centers of Excellence, directing their employees to the highest-rated providers for particular conditions across the country. Business groups on health have banded together, using their purchasing power and

collective knowledge to define clinical components and quality standards. These employer-led efforts have created pathways to safe, high-quality, and accountable health care for employees—whether they need a knee replacement, help managing a health condition, or maternity care.

Dr. Lee explained the changing dynamics of the health care market, and showed how employer-clinician partnerships can be mutually beneficial. In response to rising healthcare costs, employers have shifted more financial responsibility to

employees in the form of higher premiums and deductibles. Some employers have incentivized healthy behaviors by lowering premiums, set up on-site clinics, and created Centers of Excellence for surgery and complex care. Dr. Lee said that employers can partner with clinicians to decipher and translate health data, stratify risk, and create purchasing specifications.

"Employers across the country are striking back," Dr. Feinstein notes. "They're tired of the 30-40% of health spending that's wasted, and they're trying new and different things. They're demanding efficiency, reliability, and safety. Essentially, they're creating their own high-value health systems by assembling or identifying superb individual components."

WHAMglobal, Community Partners March for Moms

On May 6, thousands of people packed neighborhoods for the 2018 Pittsburgh Marathon. May 6 also happened to be the date of March for Moms, a national campaign that rallied people from across the U.S. to demand higher-quality maternity care.

To capitalize on the already-packed streets, the Women's Health Activist Movement Global (WHAMglobal), JHF's newest supporting organization, arranged for Pittsburgh to become a sister city

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for March for Moms. The WHAMglobal team recruited community partners from across the region, and together they formed cheer teams along the route of the Pittsburgh Marathon. In Bloomfield, Homewood, Walnut Street, and the West End, WHAMglobal cheer teams educated the public about the country's unacceptably high—and rising—maternal mortality rate, and the challenges that women face in receiving quality maternal care.

Launched in 2017, Fit with a Physician provides an opportunity for seniors of all fitness levels and abilities to get active. Venture Outdoors develops programming for Fit with a Physician, while the Allegheny County Medical Society and UPMC Rehabilitation Services help to recruit

healthcare professionals who lead the events. Program outings focus on topics such as arthritis, diabetes, and heart health.

There are many Fit with a Physician events scheduled for the spring and summer, which are free for participants age 50 and older. Leaders of the initiative are looking to establish additional partnerships with community organizations and senior centers, with a goal of expanding programming for older adults of all physical capabilities.

These recreation and exercise programs are components of JHF's larger *Senior Connections* initiative. *Senior Connections* aims to strengthen a suite of service opportunities for older adults in western Pennsylvania and beyond, including transportation and housing, exercise and recreation, geriatric-friendly health care, nutrition, and caregiver supports.

AIDS Free Pittsburgh Hosts HIV PrEP & RAPID Community of Practice Event

On May 3, more than 30 healthcare professionals from <u>AIDS Free Pittsburgh</u> (AFP) partners convened at the University of Pittsburgh to share their experiences with developing and implementing programs to spread awareness of and access to the HIV prevention medication <u>Pre-exposure prophylaxis</u> (PrEP), and rapidly link newly diagnosed HIV-positive individuals to care. The event focused on communication strategies and practice changes that support PrEP uptake and rapid linkage to care.

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Dianne L. Pettis, CRNP, provides an overview of the Allegheny County Health Department's STD Program during the HIV PrEP & RAPID Community of Practice Event on May 3.

AFP is a coalition of government agencies, healthcare institutions, and community-based organizations committed to reducing new cases of HIV by 75% and eliminating new AIDS cases in Allegheny County by 2020. AFP is financially supported by Allegheny Health Network's Allegheny Singer Research Institute and UPMC Presbyterian Shadyside, and is managed by JHF.

PrEP can reduce the chances of becoming infected by HIV by more than 90% if taken daily. The linkage to care protocol, called RAPID (Rapid ART Program Initiative for HIV Diagnoses), was developed by the San Francisco Department of Public Health to connect

newly diagnosed HIV-positive individuals with antiretroviral treatment within two days. Both quality improvement initiatives are key strategies in achieving AFP's goals.

Foundation's HPV Vaccination Initiative Featured at International Conference

In 2014, JHF launched a community-wide campaign to increase uptake of a proven, yet vastly underutilized cancer prevention tool: the Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine. Over the next three years, the campaign blanketed the Pittsburgh region with that cancer prevention message through outreach and education sessions in practices, community organizations, and schools; and toolkits and communications materials for providers, parents, and teens.

On May 4, JHF Quality Improvement Specialist Deborah Murdoch, MPH shared insights from the Foundation's HPV Vaccination Initiative during the Academic Pediatric Association's Advancing Implementation and QI Science for Children's

Healthcare conference in Toronto. Murdoch presented a poster during the conference, which attracted an international group of clinicians, nurses, educators, epidemiologists, researchers, and

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public health practitioners.

Karen Feinstein, Public Stakeholders Committee Bring the Consumer's Voice to NBME

Since 1915, the National Board of Medical Examiners (NBME) has developed tests and tools to ensure that healthcare professionals are prepared to deliver quality care to patients. The NBME's Public Stakeholders Committee, which includes Karen Feinstein, helps to ensure that these assessments reflect the needs and concerns of today's healthcare consumers.

On May 10, Dr. Feinstein and the 12 other national leaders who comprise the Public Stakeholders Committee met at the NBME's offices in Philadelphia, PA. During the meeting, the committee discussed how the NBME can engage healthcare professionals and the public around pressing issues that include eliminating healthcare disparities, improving end-of-life care, strengthening patient -provider communication, treating mental health conditions, and increasing price transparency.

The Public Stakeholders Committee is a subset of the larger, approximately 80-member NBME, which features academics, government representatives, licensing professionals, and community advocates. In 2015, Dr. Feinstein was elected to a four-year term as a member-at-large of the NBME.
